1. Format and Volume of the Manuscript

The Manuscript must be in A4 paper, written horizontally (32 lines). The length of the manuscript must be less than 25 pages, including tables and figures, references, and notes. The author must attach the title of the paper, name of the author and affiliated institution, abstract (around 200 words), and keywords ($3 \sim 5$ words).

$2\,.\,\,$ Body Text

- ① Use the font Times New Roman. Arabic figures (half size) for numbers are determined.
- Letters must be in 12 points.
 If chapters and sections are to be numbered, use "1.", "2.", etc. for chapters, and "1.1.", "2.1." etc. for sections.
- (3) For the name of a book or a journal, put in italics. For the title of a paper, use " ".
- ④ For short quotations, use " ". For long quotations, indent two spaces, and open 1 line before and after the quotation. The references must be indicated as the followings.

Tanaka (1997) says... according to Blommaert (2010), ... It is... (Suzuki, 2000: 120-121). It is said that... (Blommaert, 2010:13). It does... (Rampton, 2005; Blommaert, 2010). It appears that... (Denzin, 1989; Sakurai, 2002).

If the author is only mentioning reference sources, indicate them in the body text instead of creating notes.

(5) Tables and figures must be inserted with numbers and titles on the top and the sources on the bottom. Please notice that colored tables/ figures will be in black and white when they are printed. Pictures should be counted as a figure.

3. Notes

- 1 Notes must be at the end of the each page as footnotes.
- ② The author must put serial numbers to the notes, and indicate the parts in the body text by placing the numbers as a superscript, such as "¹", to the right. If there is a punctuation (comma or period in English papers), place the number before it.
- ③ Avoid the frequent use of notes. Try to explain in the body text.

4. References

- ① All of the references must be written at the last of the manuscript.
- ② Japanese references and non-Japanese references should be listed together, in alphabetic order of the authors.
- ③ Form of references should be as follows.

- · Write only the initial of the first and middle name when the author uses a foreign name in Japanese references.
- When there are multiple authors in English references, the order of the name must be as the followings: the lead author must be "Last Name (spell out), First Name (Initial).", and the others "First Name (Initial). Last Name (Spell out)".
- Use colon for subtitles in Japanese references as well as English ones.
- Use Romaji for Japanese references.
